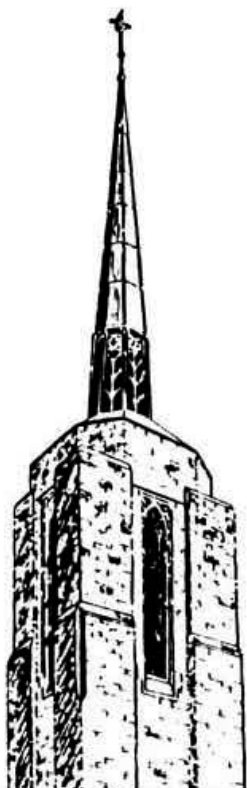


# The Spire

Each and every program, class, volunteer opportunity, meal, concert and worship service is prayerfully and conscientiously meant to remind us that we are all God's Beloved; that we are lovable to the core. This is our meaning, our mission and our ministry.

Please do read through the Spire carefully and recognize God's love as it is embodied by the Beloved people of this great parish. I am excited to see you all on September 10.

## Children's Christian Formation

### Begins September 10th

**What Matters to Us:** The goal of Children's Christian Formation at Christ Church is to help our children learn the Bible more fully, grasp their faith more deeply, and gain a tangible sense of God's love for them. Much of the curriculum revolves around the art of storytelling and active engagement with the great stories of our faith. Additional crafts and activities will be offered each week to augment the learning of this material, but at the end of the day it is these stories of God's relationship with humanity that we want our children to know.

### Godly Play

#### *Age Three Through Grade One*

Godly Play is a marvelous method of Christian education and spiritual direction primarily for younger children that is widely used in Episcopal churches. The goal of Godly Play is to teach children the art of using religious language, parable, sacred story, silence, and liturgical action to help them become more fully aware of the mystery of God's presence around them and in their lives. Godly Play is Montessori-based and uses wonderful high-quality wooden pieces to focus the children's attention on the specialness of the story and encourage them to internalize their faith through the rhetorical questions that are part of the story-telling. ### Godly Dialogue

#### *Grades Two through Six*

Building on the philosophy of Godly Play, Godly Dialogue allows children to build an awareness of God's presence by engaging with the stories of our Faith. Each weekly session is focused on dialogue and discussion about the class topics and stories, allowing the children to explore the ways they are relevant in their own lives. Over the course of 5 years children will cover the Eucharist, the Old and New Testaments, Church History and World Religions.

The Center for Spiritual Growth is beginning the fall with a focus on art and spirituality. We have invited Dr. Pamela-Tudor-Craig, (Lady Wedgwood) to give a series of lectures and visit with us through the week. A foremost authority on art and spirituality, Lady Wedgwood is a gifted speaker, a distinguished art historian and active member in the Anglican Church. A Fellow of the Society of Antiquaries and holder of a Royal Pension from HM Queen Elizabeth II, Lady Wedgwood holds a wide range of interests, with a major focus on Christian iconography. Her highly acclaimed book, *The Secret Life of Paintings*, was made into a BBC television series. She will be speaking at a variety of venues in New York, including the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the Museum of Biblical Art, and Fordham University. They are structured around a unifying theme for the year and invite theological reflection on such topics as mission and outreach, worship, the arts, world events and evangelism. We will be looking at how God is calling us to new things through the Episcopal Church's endorsement of the Millennium Development Goals, Arts and Spirituality and our Sabbath worship. On the several Sundays which do not have scheduled Forums, Bible Study on that day's readings will be offered.

## A Review of General Convention

Dear Friends,

You may have noticed the Episcopal Church making headlines this summer! Our church and its leaders have been featured on the front pages of the New York Times, in interviews on "Larry King Live," on radio news programs and in lively debates on the internet. This unusual amount of media attention stems from actions taken at General Convention, held June 13th through 21st in Columbus, Ohio. General Convention is our church's triennial meeting of bishops, clergy and lay Episcopalians to consider legislation and other matters affecting the work of our church.

General Convention 2006 was important for several reasons. It responded to the Windsor Report, most notably to its request for a moratorium on the election of any bishop living in a same gender union. Passionate and lengthy debates resulted in the adoption of a resolution calling for the exercise of restraint in the consecration of any bishop "whose manner of life presents a challenge to the wider church and will lead to further strains on communion." While most considered this resolution to be a compromise in some way or other, its adoption signaled our church's commitment to remain in conversation with the global Anglican Communion about this and other potentially divisive issues.

The Episcopal Church also made news by electing Katharine Jefferts Schori to serve as its 26th Presiding Bishop. Bishop Jefferts Schori is the first woman to be elected Presiding Bishop and will be the only female primate in the Anglican Communion. By all accounts she is extremely intelligent and compassionate with a deep dedication to issues of social justice. Her gender is bound to present a challenge to those Anglican bishops who do not recognize women's ordination and

Jefferts Schori has expressed her intention to pursue relationships with those who walk away. We ask your prayers for wisdom, fortitude and patience for our Presiding Bishop-elect.

While General Convention may seem to have generated more questions than answers, its actions are very much in keeping with the traditions of our church. Controversy over questions of theology, morality and biblical interpretation is nothing new, and we believe all members of Christ's church are welcome at the table even when we disagree. Division is painful and forgiveness is hard but, in the words of Senator John Danforth, it is time to remember that we have a higher calling. We are called to reconciliation.

Reconciliation, a recurring theme of General Convention, is possible if we listen to one another, worship together and faithfully strive to live into our shared baptismal covenant. Our broken world needs a message of hope and peace. The Episcopal Church can bring that message. We can endorse through action the United Nations' Millennium Development Goals to meet the needs of the world's poorest by the year 2015. We can demonstrate through word and deed that loving God and loving our neighbor come before any other commandment. We can listen to each other, pray for one another and love.

## The Early Show on CBS Interviews The Rev. Katherine Malin

NEW YORK, Aug. 3, 2006

**“When I first detected that call, that tickle that said ‘Hmm, maybe you should be doing this,’ I said ‘No, no! You couldn’t want me.’”** **Kate Malin**



(CBS) Kate Malin has played a lot of roles in her life: actress, wife and mom. But along the way, something changed for her. CBS News correspondent Mika Brzezinski explains how this mom of three decided to follow her religious calling.

Kate is a typical mom, overscheduled, and sometimes even a little wacky. But after she had her boys, her life’s mission began to change.

“Something very new had been opened in me when I became a mother,” she recalls. That “something” — so hard to discern at the time — would put Kate on a path toward the priesthood.

“When I first detected that call, that tickle that said ‘Hmm, maybe you should be doing this,’ I said ‘No. No!’ “ she says, laughing. “ ‘You couldn’t want me.’ “ Despite her confusion, Kate’s spiritual journey had begun. And after 9/11, she was sure.

“It was just a very intense time. I found that I was stepping into this roll of a listener, and I wanted to be there,” she remembers. “I needed to be doing this.”

So began the process of becoming an Episcopal priest, though Kate sometimes felt she was a little too human for the job. “It’s not that I sensed, ‘Oh, I may be called to the priesthood so I better just shape up. I better, you know, kick the caffeine habit and, you know, organize my apartment and somehow be perfect so that others will want to be perfect like me,’ “ she says.

“I think that’s the call of the priest, too — is to constantly be in front of your people and be with your people that you serve, you are their servant, and remind

them that you are in the mist of a struggle as they are,” she adds.

Now, seven years after she began the journey, Kate sees how the roles of priest and mom work together.

Once a week, she hosts a gathering of women where she relates directly to struggles of motherhood. What does she find challenges them the most?

“I think we all came in with the sense of ‘I’m not doing it well enough, and therefore I must not be a good Christian, you must not be a good mother. I’m somehow dropping the ball here.’ And it was such a relief for all of us, myself included, to say, ‘Ah, I’m not alone,’ “ Kate explains.

Kate and her family live in a seminary in New York City. The boys are starting to understand that their working mom has an important job.

“She tells the sermon, she sings songs,” says her son, Walker.

“Sometimes she hands out the bread and the wine,” her other son, Caleb, adds.

“For all the craziness of our life, and all the, ‘Mommy has to go to church now. Mommy’s writing a sermon,’ that there’s something they really sort of get about why I’m doing this. Why the whole family is here,” Kate says.

Caleb agrees. “She’s accomplishing something big in her life,” he says. Her little flock at home is a source of daily inspiration, where she finds the divine in the day to day.

On July 1, the Rev. Kate Malin took up her first post at a church just north of New York City.

## Christ Church Welcomes William W. Rankin!



The Rev. Dr. William W. Rankin will preach at the **8 and 10 o'clock services and present at the Adult Forum on Sunday, September 24.** Dr. Rankin, an Episcopal priest and former seminary dean, is President of the Global AIDS Interfaith Alliance (GAIA), a non-profit non-governmental organization that partners with religious organizations in resource-poor countries for community-based HIV prevention and care.

GAIA assists communities in developing locally initiated, planned, and led workshops that create detailed action plans for projects specific to community needs. These grass roots, village-level projects educate high risk groups about the disease, modify sexual behavior, promote voluntary counseling and testing for HIV, foster the social and economic empowerment of women, care for AIDS orphans, provide home-based care of ill persons, improve nutrition, and reverse the stigmatization of people with AIDS. Where medications and treatment are available, projects provide aggressive referral for treatment of opportunistic infections, sexually transmitted diseases, and HIV itself. Christ Church has actively supported the work of GAIA for the last three years and our own Dr. Etta Eskridge made her second trip to Malawi, Africa this summer as part of a team from GAIA.

**Please join us on September 24** to hear more about the work of GAIA and the impact it is making in preventing the spread of HIV/AIDS in Malawi.

## Summer Projects at Christ Church

Given the shiny floor in the church and undercroft, and the general state of cleanliness that Noel and Jose magically manage to maintain, you might not realize how much work has been going on at Christ Church over the summer. Much of this work was necessary to better house our staff. Other work was dictated by safety concerns and sound, proactive maintenance schedules that resulted from our conditions and facilities surveys.

- The floor in Taylor Hall, which suffered from a significant pre-existing moisture problem, has been removed, the concrete treated and the floor replaced.
- An apartment for our Robert G. Owen Organ Scholar was created.
- The Curate's Apartment was renovated including new bathrooms and a new kitchen.
- The Sexton's apartment underwent a long overdue bathroom renovation.
- New and upgraded electrical and plumbing service was run to all the apartments in the Kensington building.
- The Columbarium steps and landings were completely rebuilt.
- Several roofing repairs were made to the Kensington and Church roofs.
- A comprehensive GPR (radar) study was made of the church walls and particularly of the parapet walls which seem to be the source of our historic and active leaks.
- Work was done in the Rectory basement and garage.
- The Eliza Corwin Frost Child Center initiated plans for a comprehensive design scheme for our shared hallways and classrooms. Work was done this summer to enhance several classrooms.

Not exactly a slow summer, but definitely a good one. Christ Church and her vestry continue to move forward in new and exciting ways, poising ourselves for great mission and ministry in the future. - *Father Bird*

**Donation:** Clothing: Here's what we should collect and have for a typical run. Donate gently used and clean clothing. It would be even better if you could purchase some of the items listed at your favorite discount store.

- Durable pants-** Large sizes are preferred, waste sizes between 32 and 40 and above. Blue jeans are preferred over khakis. Mostly men's sizes, but bring few pairs of women's pants as well.
- Socks-** Tube socks, White or dark. ONLY NEW.
- Underwear-**Jockey style. Sizes 34 through 42. Bring a few pairs of women's briefs as well. ONLY NEW.

## Thank You from Daniel and Ada Gunn

5 August 2006

Dear Christ Church family,

We want to thank you for your ever so kind contributions to Daniel's purse. You could not have been more generous, and we were both truly overwhelmed by your astounding love and support as we move on to Wilkes-Barre. During our four years with you we had already become aware of your giving, loving nature as a parish and as individuals, yet we were not fully prepared for this final caring gesture. It together with the official farewell and the many hugs, cards, kind words, additional personal goodbyes, and on several occasions abundant tears have lead us to believe that you care for us and will miss us every bit as much as we care for and already do and will continue to miss all of you. Making us feel loved and appreciated-this is the gift for which we are truly grateful.

We very much regret not having been able to send you thanks and greetings sooner, but life has been very hectic for the past couple of months. After moving in late May, we made several trips back to Bronxville and Christ Church in June for things such as a wedding, Glen Robertson's interment, Domestic Mission Trip preparations, and finally back to lead the DMT itself at the end of June and beginning of July. As you are probably aware, this year's DMT was interrupted for us by a terrible flood scare back in Wilkes-Barre. Daniel left the trip late Wednesday afternoon to attend to his duties at St. Stephen's and to offer support to the community in crisis. I left with Daniel but was able to rejoin the group about eighteen hours later to finish the week in Virginia. The compound responsibilities of moving, being away on the DMT, and then in the midst of these finding out that we personally would possibly lose everything to the flood (our home is one block from the river) and that St. Stephen's would also likely sustain heavy flood damages-this was an amazingly difficult set of circumstances. Ultimately, our home and St. Stephen's were safe and sustained only minor damages from the extended heavy rains, but the stresses of those few days and weeks truly left us physically and psychologically waterlogged and utterly shaken. So we thank you for understanding the lateness of our response.

In addition to the flood scare and moving, the summer has been very busy at St. Stephen's. We have begun work on a new website, nearly completed a new directory, worked toward expanding our music program, and we are now exploring the acquisition of a new campus for our extensive outreach ministries. Last week we hosted the nation's largest Royal School of Church Music course. The three liturgies last Sunday brought in more than 700 people; but of course, that is only one Sunday out of the year. Preparations are underway for the fall and for Daniel's installation and induction as rector now finally set for Sunday, September 24 at 4:00 p.m. As you can see; there has not been much down-time this summer.

We are truly grateful for the love and appreciation you showed us in the purse; but more so for the support and respect you gave us throughout the four years we were in Bronxville. We miss you and will always carry fond memories of our time among you, especially knowing that we grew together and weathered so very much transition in the life of Christ Church together.
